The difference between the United States Registered Holstein and her common black and white counterpart extends far beyond simply having a twenty-seven character name on a blue certificate; it is a dedication to improvement and the creation of a value-added product. To effectively explain this to another breeder or consumer, it is vital for them to understand the history and scope of the organization, as well as its commitment to betterment. Since its inception in 1885, Holstein Association, USA has recorded the identity, ancestry, and performance information for a select group of cattle deemed to be genetically superior. Both then and now, breeders see value in tracking the genetic merit of their Holstein herds, and this has led to a significant gap in the value and characteristics of registered and grade Holsteins.

The return on this investment has been extraordinary for the 28,000 adult and junior Holstein Association members, as U.S. Registered Holsteins averaged 25,472 pounds of milk in 2011, with the rest of the national dairy herd averaging only 21,822 pounds in the same 305-day lactation. Additionally, 2012 Holstein Association, USA data indicated that the public sale price of Registered Holstein springers was nearly double that of grade Holsteins (\$2,779 vs. \$1,389) and Registered Cows were nearly three times as valuable as

their grade counterparts (\$3,403 vs. \$1,426). This gap has likely widened as a 2014 report by HolsteinWorld indicates that the average sale price for all females was \$6,040. Registered Holsteins are the benchmark for the United States Dairy Industry, and have secured a higher value due to their consistency as the most productive, highest performing subset of any breed.

In addition to its specific and unique characteristics, the Registered Holstein represents the largest breed organization in the world, and is a culmination of the hard work and ingenuity of breeders tracing as far back as its pedigree. As much as she is a testament to the will of past breeders, the Registered Holstein is a beacon of hope for the future.
